

Are You Up for a Challenge during Lent?

The success of last year's 40 Days of Giving campaign has given rise to version 2.0. All congregations are invited to join **ELCA World Hunger's 40 Days of Giving 2017** through prayer, education and financial support. Together, our goal for 2017 is to raise **\$1.5 million** during Lent.

In the season of Lent we are reminded that we are sinful: exposed as vulnerable; and, ultimately, saved as God's beloved. As we embark on the 500th anniversary of the Reformation, what better time to reflect on the power of God's self-giving love that transforms and challenges each of us?

The connection between faith, worship and justice was central for Martin Luther. His concern for the poor and his sharp rebuke of economic injustice laid the foundation for us today to see the many ways our faith calls us to strive for justice in our world.



The resource packet has already arrived in church offices and homes of congregational hunger contacts. Special resources include the 2017 Lent devotional flip calendar, a Lenten Study and children's resource for a multi-generational education series, and lots of ideas for setting goals and having fun reaching them!

Domestic Hunger Grant – Central Visitation Program



Central Visitation Program's mission is to enhance relationships between children and parents of low-income families by providing supervised visitation, exchanges, and parenting support. Supervised Visitation occurs when the courts order that a parent can only see a child in a safe setting with a neutral third party observing the visit. Central Visitation Program is pleased to be a recipient of funding from the ELCA World Hunger program.

Parents do well in the program and are frequently able to move on to unsupervised parenting time or shared custody. One success story involves Michael (name changed to protect privacy), a dad who needed to visit his two girls at the program. Michael had a problem in his past with drugs and alcohol, which lead to him needing supervised visitation.

By the time Michael started his visits with Central Visitation Program, he had been clean and sober three months and taken parenting classes. Michael did well with his girls and soon was able to go back to court and get a plan to eventually have weekend unsupervised visits.
